INFLATION LIKELY TO CAUSE INCREASE IN 2024 CONDO FEES

Coming near to the end of a calendar year, which is also the end of the financial year for Grandview Farm Condo, always raises the possibility of an increase in the monthly fee.

Based on information shared by Chairman Daryl Acor at the October 7 Condo Board meeting, an increase is virtually a certainty.

Inflation has been the driver of what appears will be a "significant shortfall between income and expenses of the HOA for this year." The challenge for next year is two-fold: make up the short fall and take into account obviously greater expenses in 2024.

There will be no regular Board meeting in November, but the December 5 Budget Meeting will lay out the proposed budget and the anticipated fee increase for each of the Condo models. It would be prudent for all of us to attend that meeting.

Last February, Condo owners voted to amend the governing documents to correct an increasing inequity that has developed over the years in the fee charged to Monarch owners. Starting in April, the Monarch fee was re duced and there was an increase in the monthly fee for Yorktowns, Lexingtons, and Townhouses.

It should be remembered there were no fee increases in 2022 and 2021.

"HARD PRUNING" OF BUSHES AT GRANDVIEW FARM IN PROCESS

In an October 26th e-mail, the Grandview Farm Board of Directors informed residents that the "annual trimming of bushes has commenced, and will continue over the next few months."

That bit of information about a two-month period sounds almost like a long-range weather forecast— no snow for Christmas.



Whatever the time it will take, there is plenty of evidence the work has started. The activity was identified as a "hard trimming." If you are a bit startled by any of it, understand most of our bushes are very old. If they are

hardy, they will come back in the spring. If not, they will be removed and replaced.

That same memo told of long-range plans for renovating the Condo planting areas, starting in front of the east and west buildings at the south entrance of the complex.

Bushes in those areas will not be trimmed



unless they are unsightly, because they are subject to removal in the future renovation .
